Presenter: Stephen Hinkle – Motivational Speaker

Learn about preparations for going to college, support at college, dorm life, jobs, independent living, adult social life, and more. When students reach the end of high school, it can be a complex experience for parents and students with disabilities to navigate the adult service system, educational system, find employment, and to plan for a quality adult life. In my presentation, you will hear strategies to open the door to a good quality of life for people with disabilities.

Following the keynote address, attendees will have the opportunity to choose which workshop to attend during each breakout session. Each session will last 50 minutes and allow time for Q&A with the presenters.

Session 1A: Using the IEP Transition Planning Process to Prepare for Post-Secondary Programs: An Overview Presenters: Cheryl Theis – Education Advocate, DREDF and Amanda Verbrugge, Case Manager – Regional Center of the East Bay

The transition requirements for students with IEP's are often poorly understood and under-utilized by schools and families. We will explore how families and youth can use the IEP and transition planning process to prepare for education and training opportunities after special education exit (with or without a diploma). Focus will be on acquiring critical self-advocacy, problem solving, independent living and disability awareness skills, and exploring options available for further education with the support of the special education team.

Session 1B: Post-Secondary Paths to Employment

Presenter: Sheraden Nicholau – State Council on Developmental Disabilities

Learn how policy and legislation like the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA), CA Employment First, Competitive Integrated Employment (CIE), and Paid Internship Programs (PIPs) and interagency collaborations such as Project SEARCH and Adult Ed certificate programs help propel California's students with developmental disabilities towards employment success.

Session 2A: College Options

Presenters: Mary Rose Ciddio – Counselor, Merritt College and Ron Nelson – Counselor, Merritt College

Explore career readiness options at the Community College, including new preparatory classes in Math and English to ready students for our new programs, non-credit classes and certificates that would prepare one for employment and/or further education, support available through the Disabled Students' Program, and transferring to a four year college.

Session 2B: The Need for Connection in Young Adults on the Autism Spectrum, or with Similar Disabilities: An Interactive Workshop

Presenter: Peter August - Therapist

Development is not a straight line. People don't always grow up in the ways we expect them to. They sometimes even seem to 'reverse course.' Understanding why this is so and what purpose it serves can be essential to helping them keep moving. For example, young adults on the Autism Spectrum can discover earlier feelings of loss and being lost just when they are beginning to establish more independent lives. But how does one know this is what is going on and, more importantly, how do we respond?
